

Fact sheet | Caravan towing safety tips



Before heading off

Make sure:

- Gas cylinders are turned off and secured and the fridge door is closed.
- Roll-out awning(s) are stored away and locked in the travel position.
- Front and rear corner stabilisers are in the up position.
- Caravan handbrake has been correctly released.
- Roof hatches, windows and stone shields are secure.
- 240v electrical cord and water hoses have been disconnected and stored away.
- Tv antenna is in the travel position.
- There are no unrestrained items in the caravan or towing vehicle that could upset the balance of the caravan or injure vehicle occupants if they came loose.
- Tyres fitted to the van are compliant with the manufacture's recommendations.
- Tyre pressure is correct on the caravan (including spare wheels). If in doubt, check with your local tyre dealer.
- Tyres on the caravan have legal tread depth and the tyre casings are not cracked or perished. Most tyre manufacturers recommend replacing tyres every five years.
- Wheel nuts on the caravan are all tightened to the manufacturer's specifications.

- The wheel brace, caravan jack and a toolbox are in the caravan.
- Coupling socket and tow ball match each other in size.
- Coupling is correctly and securely fastened.
- Anti-rattle bolt is removed from the towbar tongue receiver.
- Towbar tongue is the correct size for the caravan.
- Safety chains are correctly connected to the towing vehicle. It's recommended that rated d-shackles are used to connect the chains.
- · External mirrors are secured and adjusted correctly.
- Caravan light connections are secure, and all lights work.
- Lights and number plates are clearly visible on the caravan and towing vehicle.
- Towing vehicle and caravan are serviced to ensure they're safe and roadworthy.
- Load distribution between the towing vehicle and caravan is correct and properly balanced, front to rear and side to side. Consider weighing your caravan and towing vehicle before departure.
- Wheel chocks and jack stands are working in case tyre changes are required.

When towing

• Allow for the extra length and width of the caravan when entering traffic flow or overtaking other vehicles.

When towing (continued)

- Operate the accelerator, brakes and steering smoothly and gently to avoid caravan sway, especially in wet or slippery conditions.
- Avoid applying the towing vehicle's brakes if the caravan starts to sway or snake.
- To reduce caravan sway caused by wind buffeting, slow down when larger vehicles pass or overtake.
- If possible, keep to the hard road surface. When wheels hit a soft edge, the caravan can sway excessively, causing loss of control.
- Maintain an increased distance from the vehicle in front to allow for a longer stopping distance.
- Use a lower gear in both manual and automatic vehicles to increase vehicle control and reduce brake strain when travelling downhill.
- Where areas are provided, pull over regularly to allow following vehicles to overtake.
- Slow down at rail crossings and when travelling over bumpy roads.
- If possible, reverse with a person watching the rear of the caravan from outside the vehicle. Don't always rely on just the reversing camera.
- Towing is more stressful than normal driving and more likely to cause fatigue, so plan for extra rest stops.
- Use your side mirrors for good visibility along the full length of the towing vehicle and caravan on both sides.
- Remove the jockey wheel from its clamp and store
 it securely in the caravan or car boot. If it's a swivelmounted type, lock it in the travelling position.

- back of a hand near each caravan wheel to feel if an even amount of heat is coming from each wheel. High temperatures may indicate sticking brakes, or wheel bearing failure.
- Caravan connections are still secure, and the lights are working.
- Tyres are inflated to the correct pressure for the road surface you're driving on.
- All items in the towing vehicle and caravan are still secure and haven't come loose.
- Any roll-out awning is still properly locked in the travel position.
- Side mirrors give a clear view of the road behind the caravan.

Loaded Mass

The loaded mass of your caravan and towing vehicle must not exceed:

- The capacity of the tow bar.
- The maximum towing mass (gvm) specified by the towing vehicle's manufacturer.
- The maximum ball weight (tbm) specified by the towing vehicle's manufacturer.
- The maximum rating or towing mass (atm) the caravan can legally weigh once everything is loaded aboard, as specified by the manufacturer. Check the caravan's compliance plate for this figure.

During the trip

Make sure:

- · Couplings and chains are still correctly fastened.
- Caravan brakes are operating correctly, and wheel bearings are not overheating. At rest stops, hold the
